

The solstice happens when one of the Earth's poles has its maximum tilt away from the Sun. It happens twice a year, once in each hemisphere.

When the North Pole tilts away from the sun, daylight in the Northern Hemisphere get shorter. In 2018, the North Pole is at its furthest from the sun on December 21. We call that day the Winter Solstice. The Winter Solstice is the shortest daylight of the year in the Northern Hemisphere and the first day of winter.

In the Southern Hemisphere December 21 is the longest day of 2018 and the first day of summer because, as the North Pole tilts away from the Sun, the South Pole is tilted towards the Sun.

Three Winter Activities for December

Activity I:

Making Gingerbread Dough

Students can strengthen their fingers by playing with this wonderful smelling dough.

As an option, have students measure and mix the ingredients to make the dough.

Dry Ingredients:

I cup Flour

1/4 cup Salt

2 tsp Cream of Tartar

Wet Ingredients:

11/2 to 2 TBSP Vegetable Oil 1 cup Water

Spice Mix

I tsp each: Ground Cinnamon, Ground Ginger, Ground Nutmeg, Ground Cloves



Mix dry ingredients together first. Then add oil and water and mix well.

Have students use cookie cutters, googly eyes, buttons, ribbon and beads to make pretend cookies and ginger people or roll the dough into long ropes to form letters, numbers and words.

Practicing Critical Thinking and Storytelling with Emergent Readers

- I. Begin the lesson by asking students what they see happening in the photograph.
 - * What are Danny and Norman doing in the snow?
 - * What items are they using to make their snowman?
- 2. Make inferences about what might have been happening at the time the picture was taken.

- 3. Use voices, facial expressions and body language to tell your own story.

- 4. Go a step further and plan a dramatization of the story ideas.
