DIAMANTE POEM

A **Diamante Poem** is a seven-line poem that is arranged in a specific way to make the shape of a diamond. A **Diamante Poem** does not rhyme and is written to compare two different topics. In a **Synonym Diamante Poem**, the nouns at the beginning and end of the poem basically mean the same thing. In an **Antonym Diamante Poem**, the nouns at the beginning and end are opposites.

Use the suggestions below to write a **Diamante Poem** of your own.

- 1. Choose two topics for your **Diamante Poem**. Brainstorm some words or pictures for each of these subjects. Decide if you want your poem to be a **Synonym** or **Antonym Diamante Poem**.
- 2. Follow this pattern for your **Diamante Poem**:
 - Line 1 topic 1 (noun)
 - Line 2 two words (adjectives) that describe topic 1
 - Line 3 three action words (verbs) about topic 1
 - Line 4 a short phrase that describes both topic 1 and topic 2, or four nouns (first two describe topic, second two describe topic 2)
 - Line 5 three action words (verbs) about topic 2
 - Line 6 two words (adjectives) that describe topic 2
 - Line 7 topic 2 (noun)
- 3. Write your finished **Diamante Poem** on the other side of this paper. Cut out your poem and glue it into your *Poetry Notebook*.
