A Couplet Poem is a two-lined poem that rhymes. Each line in a Couplet should also have the same number of syllables. A Couplet Poem is also known as a Rhyming Couplet and is often silly. Couplets can be part of a longer poem, with each pair of lines having their own rhyming words at the end.

Use the suggestions below to write a Couplet Poem of your own:

1. Think about a topic that you like and write your first line.

Need some inspiration? Use Danny's Poetry Picture Prompts to help you think of an idea. Write the first line of your poem.
2. Brainstorm a list of words that rhyme with the last word in your first line.
3. Write the second line of your poem.
4. Count the syllables in each line of your poem. Do they match? If not, add or subtract words to one of your lines so that you have the same number of syllables in each line of your poem.
5. Do you have more to say? Extend your poem by adding pairs of lines. Remember, each pair of lines that you add to your poem needs to have ending words that rhyme.
6. Write your finished Couplet Poem on the other side of this paper. Cut out your poem and glue it into your Poetry Notebook.
7. Draw pictures or cut out and glue images to illustrate your poem.
